

From The Pastor



Lenten Supper and Bible Study "The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God." (Mark 1:1)

This Lent we will again be doing our five week Lenten Supper and Bible Study beginning on Thursday, March 9th at 6:00 PM and running until Thursday, April 6th.

I will be teaching out of Rowan Williams' (former Archbishop of Canterbury) book entitled "Meeting God in Mark." You do not need the book, but I would be glad to order you a copy if you are interested. It is a short read, not overly "churchy" and very accessible. Mark just happens to be my favorite Gospel. It is also the shortest! Mark tells the story of "The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God" in a very straightforward and terse way. Sort of a "just the facts" kind of style. I like that!

Archbishop Williams has this to say about his study of Mark... "Mark has often been rather ignored in the Church because it has comparatively little about Jesus' early life, teaching ministry and resurrection appearances; and conversely, by some, it has been seen as the simple and unadorned version of a story that Matthew, Luke and (especially) John then surround with complexities. It is true that Mark's brevity and intensity set it apart; but it is a mistake to think that this means it is naïve and "primitive". Mark is shot through with deeply theological perspectives, but Mark manages to embody these insights in a whole range of skillful storytelling techniques and turns of phrase. Putting great depth into apparently simple stories is something requiring enormous skill, and Mark is a great artist in this respect.

- No Sunday School classes will be held.



"One Great Hour of Sharing"

Having access to water affects all aspects of community life and growth. Matee Kakoo tells the story of her community in eastern Kenya before and after a One Great Hour of Sharing-supported sand dam was built.

Ms, Kakoo had lived in Mbangulo for 40 years and says, "the situation before the sand dam/shallow well was pathetic." She notes that the people could not bathe and people from other areas mocked them because of their appearance. People went hungry because they didn't have enough water to cook food. Their primary school had insufficient classrooms because there was no water to make bricks. The children often missed school because they needed to fetch water for their families from one of two water points, between four and seven miles away. Fetching water was a time consuming activity, walking the distance, waiting in line four to five hours and then carting it back home by foot or donkey. It took most of the day, leaving little time for other activities like school or work or farming. Women were also at risk for being sexually assaulted on their long journey to get water.

When the people of Mbangulo were first approached about constructing a sand dam, they were enthusiastic. They quickly gathered local materials that were combined with additional donated construction materials to build the dam. The people worked very hard, and within a month the dam was constructed.

Today, children are in school and there is even a shallow well on the school grounds to provide for the school's needs—including new bricks for new classrooms. Bricks are made locally with several kilns that have sprouted up in the community. Permanent houses are being built. Food is more plentiful as the water allows people to grow gardens and they have more time to tend to them.

Some, mostly women, have started table banking to boost small businesses. "We have converted time taken to go for water into other income generating activities," explains Ms. Kakoo. She reports that one group has accumulated the equivalent of over \$800 USD in their account.

Ms. Kakoo expresses her gratitude for what this water project has done for her community, "It will be remembered by generations to come."


Butter Braids are back!

We would like a minimum of 12 interested individuals to help pack supplies for the FoodBank for the Heartland BackPack program at the Foodbank Omaha location at 10525 J St, Omaha. The minimum age for participants is 16. One in five kids in Nebraska and western Iowa under the age of 18 is at-risk for hunger. Staff members at local elementary schools identify chronically hungry students then Food Bank for the Heartland supplies packs



filled with nutritious food for those children to take home on Friday afternoons. Each pack provides two breakfast meals and two lunch or dinner meals. The BackPack Program distributes 8300 packs to children in need each week in 228 schools across Nebraska and western Iowa. Please consider participating with us on March 28th to help feed the hungry. Legacy Planned Giving

DEBT PAY-OFF CAMPAIGN UPDATE As of February 23, 2017

GOOD NEWS: Our church debt was refinanced in early October 2016 with American National Bank. The terms are 5 year fixed at 3.7% with monthly payments of \$6,372.98. The REFI SAVED the church over \$16,000 in interest expense. There is the potential to save another \$12,000 to \$18,000 if we pay off the loan EARLY--in 2-3 years---instead of 5 years. Therefore, the Debt Pay Off Campaign has been extended until the loan is fully paid off. It has also been redefined so the contributions can be used to make the monthly loan payments as well as to accelerate the debt pay-off. Session unanimously approved these changes at the Nov 17, 2016 meeting.

In light of the extended and redefined Debt Pay-Off Campaign, please prayerfully consider continuing/ increasing your generous giving to paying off the remaining debt. If you have already pledged, we encourage you to amend and increase your pledge to cover the two-year period 2017 and 2018. If you have not yet pledged, we encourage you to do so. Please use the RED pledge card located on the name tag table. Please use the PINK envelopes for your contributions.

MORE GOOD NEWS. The outstanding loan balance is now down to \$311,512---from \$750,000 in July 2013. So far we have received 36 pledges to the Debt Pay-Off Campaign totaling \$75,480. Contributions received are at \$56,451 including 14,041 in unpledged donations.

Wouldn't it be marvelous if we could have the loan fully paid off in 2-3 years instead of 5 years? Along with the refinancing package this would save the church about \$30,000 in interest expense, plus free up money every year for future church growth and mission work.

UPDATE ON 2017 STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN

Current results---as of February 19, 2017---show 101 pledges totaling \$247,808. Our goal this year is to receive pledges totaling about \$264,000. This reflects an increase of about 5.3% over last year's pledged amount. So far we have received contributions of \$44,869 which includes \$12,150 of pre-paid pledges from December 2016.

Thanks go out to: Mike & Sue Tabler, Nancy Shultz, George Sayles and Michelle Thompson for being the first to sign up. We need about 30 more to volunteer. Please sign up, if you are available to join us for 15 to 30 minutes in Sunday School on Sunday, May 21st and you are 50 or over. You will be assigned a child to "grandparent". You'll have a chance to bless them (I'm providing the blessing unless you want to write your own). Then you and your assigned child will promise to pray for each other over the summer and to check in when you see each other at worship. It's pretty easy and low key. But it could be awesome. I am praying it is awesome for both you and the kids!
