

### Looking for...

The Age of Discovery which began in the early 1400's was a very important period in European history. Many important discoveries about the world were made, many by accident. If you remember your history, Columbus was searching for a quick and easy sea route to Asia. Having finally convinced Ferdinand and Isabella of Spain to back him in his endeavor, he set sail for what he thought was India on August 3, 1492. What he found on October 12th of that same year was not India, but the West Indies. It was only after several additional voyages, that he finally realized that what he had found was a new continent, and not a shorter route to Asia. Sometimes we



are a lot like Columbus in that we put so much effort into searching for something very specific that we feel we must have to make our lives complete. What we often find in our searching is that rather than just meeting our goals, we discover something totally new and exciting, something far better than our hopes and dreams would have been all too happy to settle for.

In Luke 19:1-10, Zacchaeus, the tax collector, a man hated because he collaborated with the Romans and had become wealthy at the expense of his people, heard that Jesus was coming through Jericho and he wanted to see Jesus. Because he was a short man, he climbed a tree so he could get a better look. Zacchaeus accomplished his goal that day, or so he thought. As Jesus walked by the tree, he stopped and looked up and told Zacchaeus to come down because he was going to his house for dinner. Zaccheus was willing to settle for nothing more than a quick peek at Jesus. What he discovered was a whole new world. Zacchaeus found new life in Christ and used that new life to serve others.

I think that a lot of life these days is about searching. Searching for peace of mind, love, comfort, a good life, perhaps even notoriety or "the next big thing". And we are willing to settle for those things and nothing more. Sometimes our searching can take us to places and bring us into contact with people and put us in situations that we do not expect. Sometimes we discover that what we have found is much more than we were searching for. What we often find is that Christ has already gone ahead of us into our lives; into the hardship, pain, suffering, and loss we so often experience. We find that Christ is already waiting for us up ahead to welcome us into new life. We find God in people and places we would never think to look. We discover that God is much better than anything we were willing to settle for.

So, Happy Columbus Day. May you discover God in new ways. In new people. Through new adventures and in new places. May you discover that God who goes before us, in Jesus Christ, is so often found, even and especially in the darkest and scariest corners of our lives. Amen

### Hands on Mission Opportunity


The mission committee of First Presbyterian Church is sponsoring a mission outreach activity for **Friday**, October 5th 12:00 to 3:30 pm in the afternoon. We would like a minimum of 12 interested individuals to help pack supplies for the FoodBank for the Heartland BackPack program at the Foodbank Omaha location at 10525 J St, Omaha. The minimum age for participants is 16. One in five kids in Nebraska and western Iowa under the age of 18 is at-risk for hunger. Staff members at local elementary schools identify chronically hungry students then Food Bank for the Heartland supplies packs filled with nutritious food for those children to take home on Friday afternoons. Each pack provides two breakfast meals and two lunch or dinner meals. The BackPack Program distributes 8300 packs to children in need each week in 228 schools across Nebraska and western Iowa. Please consider participating with us on October 5th to help feed the hungry. Sign-up sheet is available in the Library.

#### **RETIRE CHURCH DEBT IN 2019**

In 2003 FPC took out a loan of almost \$1.7 million to finance our major building expansion and renovations. At the end of 2018, we will still have \$188,000 remaining on that loan. Our monthly payments are about \$6,300 with fixed interest at 3.7%. The balance in the building fund will cover the September to December 2018 payments. End of 2018 contributions will hopefully cover the first few (3-6) months of 2019---BUT NOT BEYOND.

What options do we have to retire the outstanding loan balance?

Retire debt by mid-2021. With next year's payments, the balance will still be about \$120,000 at the end of 2019. We will need about \$75,000 in 2020 and \$45,000 in 2021. Funding that amount will very negatively impact our future operating budgets. Many of you have been pledging and making payments to the ongoing campaign. FPC has been greatly blessed by your generosity; however, the current building campaign ends December 31, 2018.

Fully retire the debt in 2019. A very attractive alternative would be to pay off the loan. Thus there is the need for one more FINAL CAMPAIGN to fully retire our remaining debt next year.

A special **2019 Retire the Debt Pledge** line item on the 2019 Pledge Card gives you the opportunity to make as generous of a pledge as possible to this worthy goal of fully retiring the debt in 2019. Please prayerfully consider making a best estimate of your giving by entering your one-time final building pledge as part of the Stewardship Campaign. Of course, this pledge should be above and beyond your generous giving to the 2019 Operating Budget. If your tax situation warrants, consider prepaying part or all of your 2019 contributions prior to December 31, 2018.

## Children's Ministry

Several weeks ago, I had lunch with a Christian Education cohort from another church. It was a day off for me, and we met over by her church, at a restaurant by Oakview Mall. It was a restaurant that was thriving just a few years ago. But things have changed for

Oakview and for that restaurant. We walked in at noon and were immediately seated. I looked around and almost <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> of the place was empty. The restaurant was SO quiet! Our server had one other table all through the lunch hour, and yet our food was slow in coming and our order wasn't right. The whole experience felt wrong.

This last week, I had lunch with a group of friends at another restaurant closer to my house. We had to wait quite a while to be seated. Every table was full and it was SO loud, we could only hear the people who were sitting on each side of us. That also felt wrong.

I tell you this story because of a "problem" we are wrestling with now and this is the closest analogy I have. Sunday School classes can feel "wrong" too, when they are too small and when they are too full. I feel very blessed that we are dealing with a situation of being a little too full in our Preschool and Elementary Sunday School. Oh sure, we can bring in more tables and chairs. With a rearrangement of furniture to make it more like a school classroom, we could fit everyone and always have an open chair, so the kids know they can bring friends. But we don't want a formal setting, and we sure don't want to just fit bodies in an open chair. It is vitally important to us, that each child feels known and loved, as an individual child of God. We want the kids to grow close to each other, to feel our care and concern and most importantly to grow closer to God.

We have a wonderful teaching team and we are taking some steps to make our class function better. I have a Plan B and a Plan C and we won't give up. Parents, we need to keep the communication lines open and please let any of our teaching team know if your child ever feels left out or overlooked.

Of course, we'd also love to hear if we get things right. But either way, let's work together to make everyone's Sunday school experience as positive, encouraging and personal as it possibly can be.

As I write this, September 30<sup>th</sup> is this coming Sunday. It's a very special day for a number of reasons. It will be the first Sunday of the school year for the kids to sing in worship.
