Mission Living

"One of the scribes came near and heard them disputing with one another, and seeing that he answered them well, he asked him, "Which commandment is the first of all?" Jesus answered, "The first is, 'Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one; you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength.' The second is this, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no other commandment greater than these." (Mark 12:28-31)

This passage from Mark is the foundation for Mission. With these three great commandments, Jesus instructs in how we should live with God and with ourselves and with each other. It all comes down to love. Loving God by loving ourselves and loving our neighbor. Immediately following this passage, Jesus will tell the parable of the Good Samaritan so we can see exactly who our neighbor is. Mission is nothing more than loving God by loving our neighbor. When we as Christians engage in Mission, we go out into the world and bring the Gospel message to our neighbors by how we live and by how we care for them. Sometimes mission may take us to places we would rather not be and to people we would rather not associate with. But that's what loving God requires of us. Going and doing for others in ways we may not always like. Going and doing for the least and the most vulnerable in our world.

In these days of COVID-19, our world seems to be shrinking in on us. Many of us are stuck at home with no place to go and nothing to do. That can be a very frightening and boring and maddening place to be. We would prefer to just go about doing the business of our lives and going where we feel like going whenever the mood strikes us. And it's easy to resent the constraints that are placed on us. And it's easy to resent the least and the most vulnerable among us that require us to take on these drastic restrictions on our life. But let me rephrase those sentiments for you.

Loving God means loving our neighbor. Sometimes the work of loving our neighbor requires us to do things and to change our lives to protect and preserve those who are most vulnerable. The work of love is not easy. It takes patience and trust and respect.


What if you were to look at these days of restriction and change as another way we go about doing mission? What if we looked at being homebound as a way we can love our neighbor and love God? Yes, it means changing how we live for right now. Yes, it means foregoing doing things we enjoy. It even means working a

little harder to score some much needed toilet paper! But love is like that

sometimes.

How about we look at these days of COVID-19 as just one more way we show God how much we love him by how we love and care for those who are most at risk of illness among us? As for the icing on the cake, you don't need to go anywhere, it won't cost you any money and you can be in mission while you sit on the couch watching your favorite TV show. Does it get any better than that? So take this time of change and disruption as your chance to love your neighbor.



DEBT PAY-OFF CAMPAIGN UPDATE As of March 23, 2020

FPC loan balance is down to \$100,042. The Building Fund contains only \$29,110 which will pay the monthly payments only for the next 4 months---through July 2020. At that time, the balance will still be approximately \$75,000..

Please continue with your contributions. If we can raise enough money to make payments through December, and if we can raise another \$40,000 at the end of this year, we can have the remaining debt fully paid off EARLY which will save FPC another \$1,000 to \$2,000 in interest expense.

Find a verse that speaks to you and post it on your mirror, refrigerator or front door. This is a perfect time for us all to find a memory verse. It's so helpful when we are feeing frightened to have scripture in our heads to repeat and find our calm and our hope.

I hope we can find other creative ways to be together and support each other. Call a church friend, send a card, send an e-mail or text.

Last time I mentioned Pastor Mike's sermon message at the beginning of Lent, a call to take time to relax, pray and open ourselves to the Spirit's leading. Who knew a lot of us would have an abundance of time to take this to heart and put it into action.
